# Ohio's Safe Business Practices for Getting Back to Work



1.

**Recommend face coverings** for employees and clients/customers.



4.

**Clean and sanitize** workplaces throughout workday and at the close of business or between shifts.



2.

**Conduct daily health assessments** by employers and employees (self-evaluation) to determine if "fit for duty."



5.

**Limit capacity** to meet **social distancing** guidelines.

- Establish maximum capacity at 50% of fire code.
- And, use appointment setting where possible to limit congestion.



3.

**Maintain good hygiene** at all times – hand washing and social distancing.

### Impacts on Older Adults

- Risk for Severe Illness Increases with Age
- Severe Illness Increases with Underlying Medical Conditions

**What You Can Do If You Are at Increased Risk for Severe Illness from COVID-19**

**Are You at Increased Risk for Severe Illness?**



Based on what we know now, those at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19 are:

- Older adults
- People of any age with the following:
  - Cancer
  - Chronic kidney disease
  - COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
  - Immunocompromized state (weakened immune system) from solid organ transplant
  - Obesity (body mass index [BMI] of 30 or higher)
  - Serious heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, or cardiomyopathies
  - Sickle cell disease
  - Type 2 diabetes mellitus

**Here Is What You Can Do to Help Protect Yourself**



Limit contact with other people as much as possible.



Wash your hands often.



**Avoid close contact** (6 feet, which is about two arm lengths) with people who are sick.



**Clean and disinfect** frequently touched surfaces.



**Avoid all cruise travel** and non-essential air travel.

Call your healthcare professional if you are sick.






Data has shown that racial and ethnic minority groups with the referenced conditions are at even higher risk for severe COVID-19 illness. Race and ethnicity are risk markers for other underlying conditions that impact health — including socioeconomic status, access to health care, and increased exposure to the virus due to occupation (e.g., frontline, essential, and critical infrastructure workers).

\*Conditions include asthma, obesity, diabetes, chronic kidney disease, severe obesity, coronary artery disease, history of stroke and COPD.





## Reopening Adult Day Facilities



- What is the authority being used to implement adult day care service testing?
  - Ohio Revised Code 3701.13
  - Schedule strategically to align with reopening of Sept. 21, 2020
- Which facilities must participate in testing pursuant to the Order?
  - Adult Day Care Facilities
  - Senior Centers

# Testing

Reopening Adult Day Facilities



- Who must be tested?
  - Requires testing of all facility staff
  - Requires testing of all participants
  - Recommends testing non-staff members who come and go from the facility
- What is the required testing cadence?
  - Baseline testing of all staff and participants
  - Repeat testing of staff and participants at least once every other week

# Testing

Reopening Adult Day Facilities



- What kind of tests are considered compliant for the purposes of the Order?
  - Diagnostic RT-PCR
  - Rapid Point-Of-Care Antigen Testing
- Can antibody testing be used to comply with the Order?
  - No, only diagnostic tests

# Testing

## Reopening Adult Day Facilities



- Is documentation of participant or staff consent required for testing?
  - Follow standard consent procedures for both participants and staff
- What should a facility do if staff refuse to be tested?
  - Order states facilities shall implement COVID-19 testing of all participants and staff consistent with protocols and guidelines established by ODA, in consultation with ODH
  - Educate and inform staff of the requirements and value of on-going testing

# Testing

## Reopening Adult Day Facilities



- If staff work at multiple facilities, are they required to be tested at each facility?
  - No, the facility is required to ensure all staff have been tested and obtain and retain test records
- What should facilities do if they identify participants or staff who need to be tested because they are symptomatic and/or have known exposure to COVID-19?
  - Facilities should immediately implement appropriate infection control measures and contact their local health department for further guidance
  - Facilities should have protocols in place for prioritizing testing of symptomatic individuals quickly

# Testing

## Reopening Adult Day Facilities



- If staff or participants test positive for COVID-19, will the facility be required to undergo contact tracing?
  - Yes, the local health department will conduct contact tracing within the facility for staff and participants who have been exposed to COVID-19
- When can staff who have tested positive, been exposed to, or are displaying symptoms of COVID-19 begin working again?
  - All facilities must comply with [ODH Contingency and Crisis Facility Staffing Guidance](#)

Note: Asymptomatic personnel may work while awaiting test results. Repeat testing assesses if first test was a false negative or done during incubation period. This guidance is relevant for all Health Care Personnel and potentially exposed staff and individuals not directly involved in patient care e.g. (clerical, food & laundry service) as described by [cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/hcp/guidance-risk-assessment-hcp.html](https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/hcp/guidance-risk-assessment-hcp.html). Please note: Potential exposures can occur when personnel come within 6 feet of an infected person for at least 15 minutes or during performance of an aerosol-generating procedure or from direct contact with infectious secretions while not wearing recommended PPE.

### CDC Definitions

#### Isolation:

Isolation is used to separate people infected with the virus (those who are sick with COVID-19 and those with no symptoms) from people who are not infected. People who are in isolation should stay home until it's safe for them to be around others. In the home, anyone sick or infected should separate themselves from others by staying in a specific "sick room" or area and using a separate bathroom (if available).

#### Quarantine:


Quarantine is used to keep someone who might have been exposed to COVID-19 away from others. Quarantine helps prevent spread of disease that can occur before a person knows they are sick or if they are infected with the virus without feeling symptoms. People in quarantine should stay home, separate themselves from others, monitor their health, and follow directions from their state or local health department. #### 10/1/1 rule:

- 10 days have passed since symptoms first appeared AND
- 1 day (24 hours) have passed without fever without the use of fever-reducing medications (anti-pyretics) AND
- 1 day of improvement in respiratory symptoms

Note: CDC guidance for COVID-19 may be adapted by states to respond to rapidly changing local circumstances

### Mitigation of Personnel Shortage Tiers:



#### Tier 1

- All wear face masks; wash hands before and after patient contact or touching mask/face
- Standard precautions (gown and glove with contact with blood and body fluids)
- All personnel get temperature and symptom checks prior to shift

#### Tier 2: Must complete everything in Tier 1 in addition to the following:

Allow asymptomatic health care professionals (HCP) who have had an [unprotected exposure](#) to SARS-CoV-2 (the virus that causes COVID-19), but are not known to be infected, to continue to work.

- A face mask, instead of a cloth face covering, should be used by these HCP for source control while in the facility and must be worn for 14 days after the exposure event.
- If HCP develop even mild symptoms, they must cease patient care activities, notify their supervisor and arrange testing

#### Tier 3: Must complete everything in Tier 1 and Tier 2 in addition to the following:

If shortages continue despite other mitigation strategies, allow HCP with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 who are well enough to work but have not met all [Return to Work Criteria](#) to work. If HCP are allowed to work before meeting all criteria, they should be restricted from contact with severely immunocompromised patients (e.g., transplant, hematology-oncology) and facilities should consider prioritizing their duties in the following order:

- If not already done, allow HCP with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 to perform job duties where they do not interact with others (e.g., patients or other HCP).
- Allow HCP with confirmed COVID-19 to provide direct care only for patients with confirmed COVID-19, preferably in a cohort setting.
- Allow HCP with confirmed COVID-19 to provide direct care for patients with suspected COVID-19.

• As a last resort, allow HCP with confirmed COVID-19 to provide direct care for patients without suspected or confirmed COVID-19. This must be communicated to the local hospital and health district coalition partners and other members of the Congregate Care Unified Response Team BEFORE implementing this mitigation strategy in the event that additional resources may be garnered.

If HCP are permitted to return to work before meeting all [Return to Work Criteria](#), they should still: Self-monitor for symptoms (seeking re-evaluation if symptoms recur or worsen) and wear a face mask for source control at all times while in the healthcare facility, even in non-patient areas such as break rooms.

- A face mask for source control does not replace the need to wear an N95 or higher-level respirator (or other PPE) when indicated, including when caring for patients with suspected or confirmed COVID-19.

HCP should be reminded that in addition to potentially exposing patients, they could also expose their co-workers. If they must remove their face mask, for example, in order to eat or drink, they should separate themselves from others.

# Testing

## Reopening Adult Day Facilities



- How will facilities report testing compliance to the State?
  - Facilities shall have policies and procedures developed to implement and monitor participant and staff testing
  - Facilities shall maintain all documentation necessary to demonstrate compliance with the Order and upon request, testing information must be made available immediately
- Is the state supporting facility testing?
  - Yes, at this time

## Reduced Capacity, Spacing

- Cohort participants to minimize the risk of disease spread and adverse health outcomes
- Minimize points of entry
- Change building layout to promote infection control, including holding area for symptomatic individuals
- Follow other state protocols for gyms and pools

# Facilities

Reopening Adult Day Facilities



## Sanitation

- Implement CDC guidance for cleaning, disinfecting, and sanitizing
- Maintain adequate inventory of PPE
- Establish hand washing or a sanitation station at facility entrance
- Make sanitizer available for facility and staff participants

## Air Circulation

- Limit use of fans

## Signage and Communication

- Develop a communication plan including how you plan to reach different audiences and all reopening requirements (e.g. families, staff, community)

Require staff to wear face coverings except for one of the following reasons:

- Facial coverings in the work setting are prohibited by law or regulation.
- Facial coverings are in violation of documented industry standards.
- Facial coverings are not advisable for health reasons.
- Facial coverings are in violation of the business' documented safety policies.
- Facial coverings are not required when the employee/volunteer works alone in an assigned work area.
- There is a functional reason for an employee/volunteer not to wear a facial covering in the workplace.

### CARES Act - Coronavirus Relief Fund Local Government Assistance Program

Funding Opportunity Categories: COVID-19

The Office of Budget and Management (OBM), in accordance with HB 481, is distributing Coronavirus Relief Funds provided to the state from the US Department of Treasury as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"). OBM is currently accepting registrations for the Local Government Assistance Program from counties and jurisdictions. Registrations enable the recipient of funds access to the grants portal to report on funds as required by OBM and HB 481. Funds must be used in accordance with the requirements of Section 5001 of the "Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act," as described in 42 U.S.C. 601(d) and must adhere to guidance published by the US Department of Treasury and OBM. Resolutions, as required by HB 481, may be submitted to OBM via e-mail at grants@obm.ohio.gov. While the CRF disbursements for cities, villages, and townships will flow from the state through county auditors, OBM considers each local government to be a subrecipient of the state and will structure reporting and monitoring that way.

To account for the significant proportion of community college students who are enrolled part-time, an additional weight was included to normalize the FTE to headcount enrollment ratio in the community college sector, specifically. #### CARES Act - Coronavirus Relief Fund – Provider Relief Payments

The State of Ohio is distributing Coronavirus Relief Funds provided to the state from the US Department of Treasury as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"). The Ohio Department of Medicaid (MCD) prepared funding allocations to provide critically-needed economic support to several provider types including: Skilled Nursing Facilities; Private Intermediate Care Facilities for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICFs/IID); MyCare Waiver Providers; Ohio Home Care Waiver Providers (OHCW); PASSPORT Waiver Providers; Home Health Waiver Providers; Assisted Living Providers; Critical Access, Rural, Distressed Hospitals; and Behavioral Health Providers. These funds will be distributed through OBM and not through any existing state health and human service agency line item. While recognizing the importance of all health care and community support services, these funds will be distributed to providers that are more heavily relied upon for essential services through the Medicaid program. Provider relief payments will be made by OBM to providers upon completion of registration and certification online through OBM's Ohio Grants Partnership website. To register for this economic support relief payment, a Provider must have a valid Medicaid Provider Number, National Provider Identification Number, Tax Identification Number and/or Ohio Department of Health Residential Care Facility License Number. For providers that have a DUNS (Dun and Bradstreet) number, then that will be required to be entered as well. Those providers that do not have a DUNS should enter



### How to Request Resources Through Your County EMA

#### RESOURCE REQUESTS BEGIN AT THE COUNTY LEVEL

The emergency management system in Ohio is a tiered effort. When a local government or health care facility needs additional resources or supplies to deal with an emergency, a request for resources should be placed with the respective county Emergency Management Agency (EMA), who will attempt to find resources at the local or regional level.

When an emergency exceeds the capacity of the local government, the county EMA will make a request to the state through the Ohio Emergency Management Agency (Ohio EMA). If an emergency exceeds the capacity of the state, aid is requested by Ohio EMA through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

When making a request to the county EMA, specificity about the situation at hand is of paramount importance – details matter.

When reaching out to your county EMA, be prepared with the following information:

- Details about the incident/situation
- The gap between existing resources and what is needed to handle the incident/situation
- Details about how you have tried to fill that gap locally (asked for volunteers; reached out to the local business community, attempts to purchase goods, etc.)




